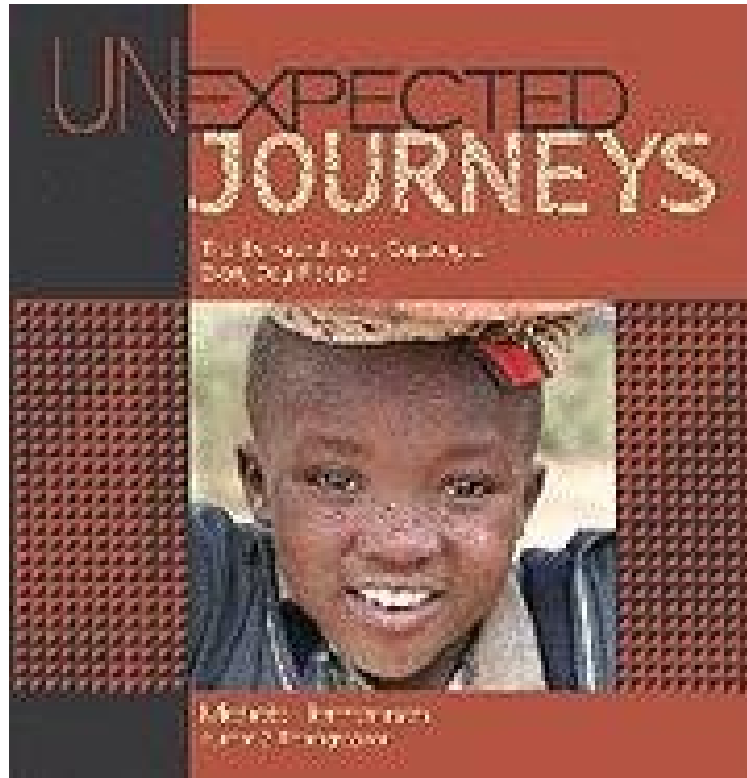


Unexpected Journeys
